Noongar Name: Mangar

Scientific Name: Dianella Revoluta

<u>Common Name</u>: Wavy Flax Lily

Blueberry Lily

Leaves: firm, strappy leaves


<u>Flowers</u>: six blue-lilac petals curl backward, while yellow and brown filaments and anthers spray the other way

<u>Fruit</u>: edible sweet blue-purple berries from 4-10mm in diameter with tiny, nutty seeds

Size: Height – 1m Width – 1.5m

<u>Location</u>: forests, woodland and mallee regions in southwest WA and other Australian states, except for the Northern Territory.

<u>Attracts Wildlife</u>: birds, bees, insects



Usage:

- leaves were traditionally used for cord and string
- fruit can be enjoyed fresh or cooked in sweet or savoury dishes
- plant root can be pounded and roasted for eating
- traditionally used as a tea ingredient in Aboriginal medicine
- both root and leaf were used to remedy colds and headaches, respectively

Interesting Facts:

- flowers only last for a day
- Scientific name comes from *Dianella* 'Diana' Roman Goddess of the hunt, often associated with woodlands, and the suffix 'ella' meaning small and **revoluta** derived from 'revolute', referring to the leaves in-rolled margins
